From the President's Desk

Teachers from the CEEP Project had been trained on health issues to gradually set up a preventive health care system for the communities.

The children from Model School were invited for a children's party at Raj Bhavan to meet the Honorable Governor of West Bengal, Shri M. K. Narayanan.

More than 6700 children and young adults from Dantewada and Sukma district, Chhattisgarh, received services as part of the TF Dishari Project.

The renowned painter, Wasim Kapoor helped the children from Model School to paint a mural at the Dharmadas Trust Model School.



TF has trained 200 young adults as part of the Shilpa Gram project. 95 have been placed in jobs, 26 are self-employed. The others have decided to continue their education.

This year, 42 volunteers and interns from different countries worked for the benefit of Tomorrow's Foundation (TF) children. They prepared teaching learning material, conducted classes for the children, helped in fund raising and trained the children to play football.

100% of the Open School students passed their examination.

All children from the Uttaran-Bastar project have been mainstreamed in the formal school system according to their age.

The Charaibeti Project provided special education, therapy and counseling services to 303 children. Thanks to Charaibeti, 83 children with disabilities have been mainstreamed in the formal school system.

Out of 246 children from the Mother Project who took an examination, 232 (94%) have passed

TF conducted a study covering 76 panchayats from 8 affected districts of Jharkhand to understand the extent of the issue of seasonal migration. As per the study report more than 70,000 children migrate every year and remain out-of-school. TF is currently taking care of 198 children in 3 seasonal hostels established in 3 affected panchayats of Jharkhand.

6 projects received support from the state and local governments of West Bengal and Chhattisgarh.

8406 children from 8 districts of 3 states have been reached through TF projects in 2012-13.

Pradip Kumar Bannerjee, a famous footballer who captained the Indian team met TF children during a football practice.

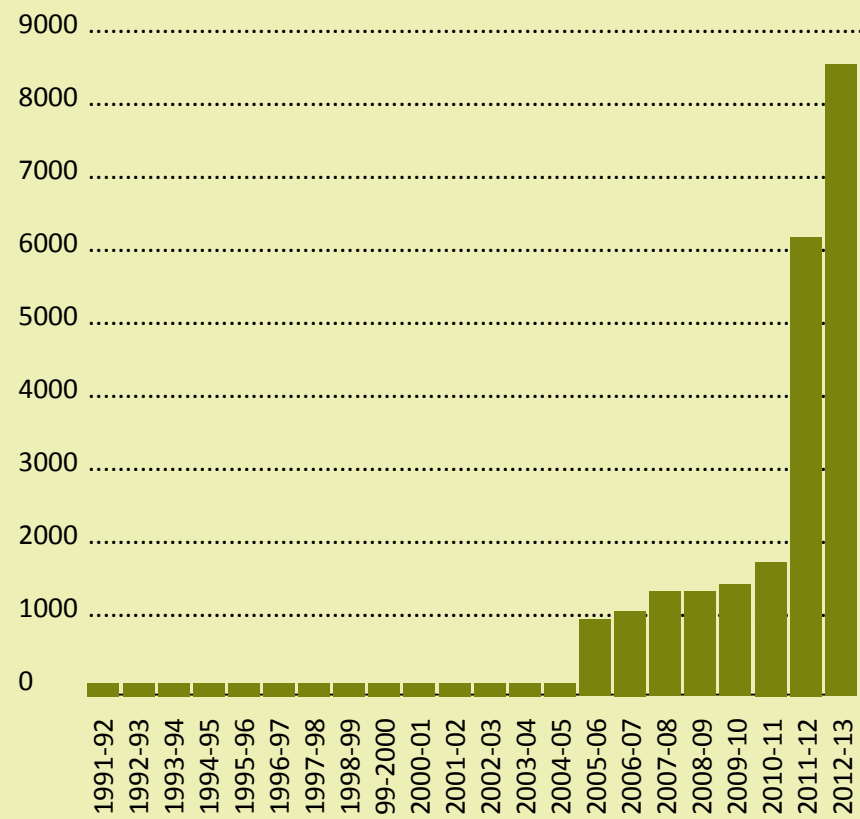

Mother Project

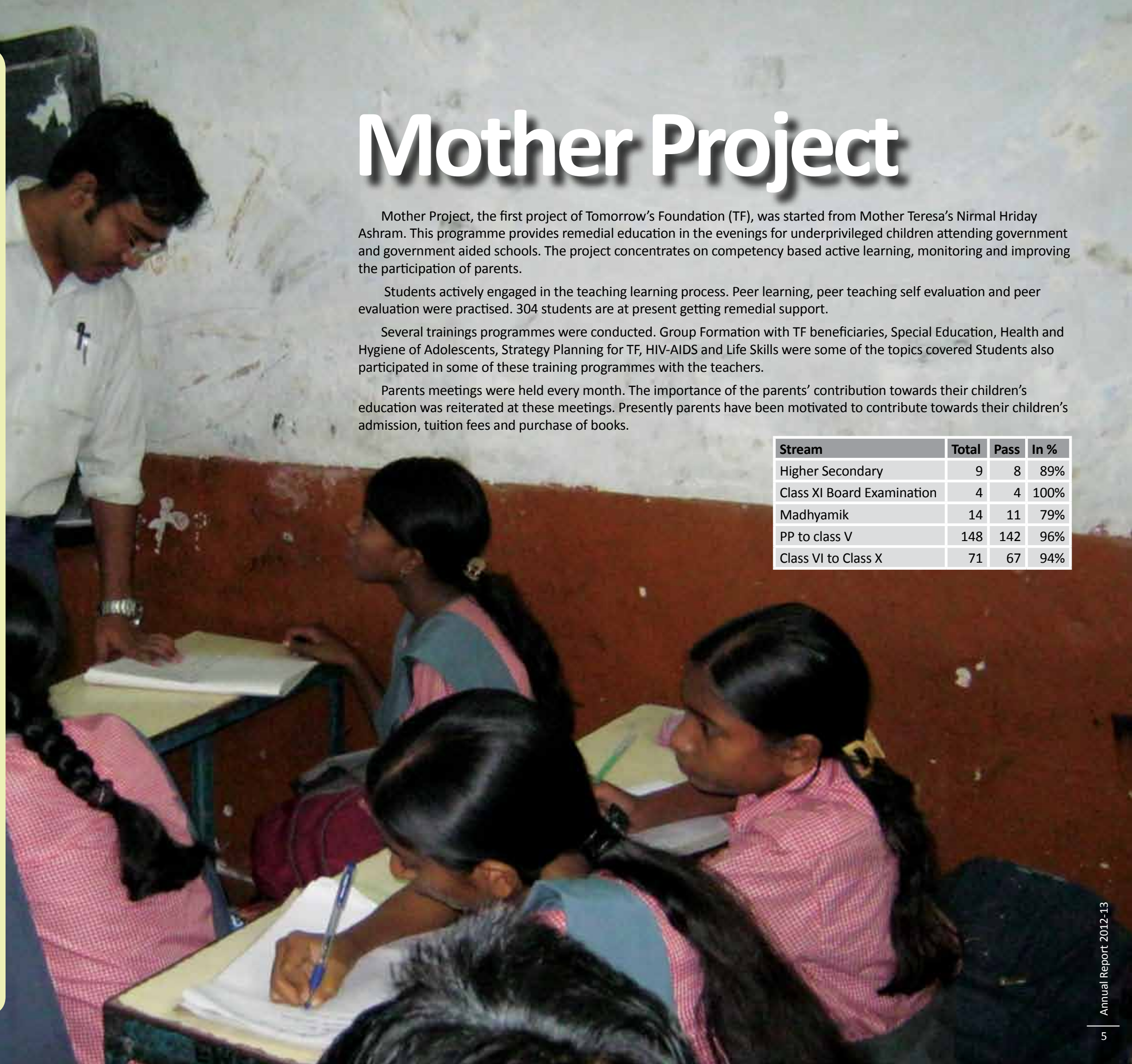
Mother Project, the first project of Tomorrow's Foundation (TF), was started from Mother Teresa's Nirmal Hriday Ashram. This programme provides remedial education in the evenings for underprivileged children attending government and government aided schools. The project concentrates on competency based active learning, monitoring and improving the participation of parents.

Students actively engaged in the teaching learning process. Peer learning, peer teaching self evaluation and peer evaluation were practised. 304 students are at present getting remedial support.

Several trainings programmes were conducted. Group Formation with TF beneficiaries, Special Education, Health and Hygiene of Adolescents, Strategy Planning for TF, HIV-AIDS and Life Skills were some of the topics covered. Students also participated in some of these training programmes with the teachers.

Parents meetings were held every month. The importance of the parents' contribution towards their children's education was reiterated at these meetings. Presently parents have been motivated to contribute towards their children's admission, tuition fees and purchase of books.

The Model School is a Kolkata Municipal Corporation (KMC) recognized school, where innovative methods are used, to educate deprived children from Pre Primary to Class V. Activity Based learning is properly practised Continuous comprehensive evaluation was carried out and individual evaluation records have been maintained. The children have progressed academically and developed social skills and competencies. A team

of teachers and support staff go to the community to meet the parents and children every day to keep the attendance stable and to increase enrolment.

At present there are 68 students in Model School:

98% of the parents are contributing towards their child's education. Parents regularly participated in the teaching learning process. Monthly Parent/Teacher

meetings were organized to discuss and share the issues and concerns regarding the individual child. The Inspector Education, KMC visited the school and promised support for the future.

Students have benefited through the resource assistance received from Sarva Siksha Avian.

CEEP (Community Education and Empowerment Programme)

CEEP is a comprehensive integrated community development programme with a focus on the education of out-of-school children. The project is designed to address the education, health and empowerment related needs of the community. The project mainly caters to children in the age group of 9-16 years. Experienced community teachers run the centres in the slums of South and East Kolkata.

This year 67 children, 14 boys and 53 girls have been mainstreamed. 7 candidates completed the Basic and Advance course on stitching and tailoring in the Swabalamban programme. 70 adolescent boys and girls and 82 mothers participated in the Adolescent Health and Mother & Child Health Care training programmes. From among them, 36 peer educators have been identified to spread awareness in the community and in future will work for TF in this aspect.

Several trainings were conducted for the CEEP teachers on capacity building, self development, reproductive health, Right to Information, HIV & AIDS) & etc.

9 Self Help Group have been formed in CEEP locations through which the women of the area are becoming more conscious about their children's future prospects and are realizing the need for saving. The parents have started contributing towards their children's education.

MOUs have been signed with local clubs where the CEEP centres are running. The clubs are now more involved and are participating in this programme.

The main objective of the project is to help children with disability cope with daily living skills and start the process of formal education with an aim to mainstream them in the future. The focus on mainstreaming the children, working closely with parents, schools and local communities and faith in the 'different abilities' of these children, ensured the success of this project.

Two mobile units of Special Education on Wheels set up in two buses are moving around targeted coverage areas on different days of the week with special educators and therapists. They identify mentally challenged, visually impaired children, severely physically challenged children and provide special education to them in the buses. The project team is in continuous touch with the schools so as to ensure that children who have been mainstreamed are able to cope and continue. The mobile units are also empowering the parents to handle their wards and raise awareness on disabilities.

In the last two years the Charaibeti project helped 83 children with disabilities to be mainstreamed in formal schools.

Open School

Often, a child is unable to be enrolled in a regular school as he/she is already shouldering the responsibility of the family. In such cases, open schooling is the best available option.

At present TF is running coaching classes for Class X and XII examinations of the Rabindra Mukta Vidyalaya, an Open School instituted by the Government of West Bengal. Currently there are 119 students in the Open School Unit. This project has also started providing coaching and examination facilities for Open Basic Examinations (for class III, V and VIII) and graduation from NSOU (Netaji Subhash Open University) & CU (Calcutta University).

Training on Reproductive Health was conducted for the students and teachers of this project. All the trainers and the students participated in the awareness programme in the community. Regular follow-up was carried out with the study centres and out-sourced teachers. Special home visits were made for irregular students. Parents meetings were held as per need. Residential teaching support along with regular classes just before examinations were arranged.

NCVT (National Council for Vocational Training)

The NCVT project, aims at creating opportunities for low cost, market oriented professional training with maximum practical exposure. This project provides training on computer software and tailoring. This year out of 30 students, 10 students have started their own stitching unit. The computer training is helping them a great deal for their future.



Hole-in-the-Wall

This innovative project for underprivileged children in the age group 6-14, enables them to learn computing skills. 8 unmanned computers loaded with self learning materials, were installed in those community areas where TF works - like Kalighat, Chetla Lock-Gate & Tollygunge. Two learning stations have been installed in the Karli unit of Uttaran Bastar project (Chhatisgarh) and another two learning centres in Bijapur unit of the same project.

The objective of this project is to improve the academic skills of the children while promoting discussion, curiosity and memory, as well as developing their analysis and synthesis capabilities.



Uttaran - Bastar

The extreme violence over the years in Chhattigarh has orphaned hundreds of children . Two residential units have been established in Dantewada and Bijapur as part of the TF Uttaran-Bastar project started in 2010, with the aim of finding career opportunities for 150 orphans.

At present, all the children have completed Bridge Courses and have started going to formal schools.

Now, the objective is to conduct professional courses to improve their employability and place them in suitable jobs after completion of graduation and professional or technical training.

All the children assiduously practised sports every day, especially football as well kabadi, karate and handball. Cultural activities were regularly organized in both the centres. The children from Bijapur participated in craft making competition and won prizes. Children from Dantewada participated in block level dance competition and won prizes. Training on basic theatre skills has also been conducted.

Training programmes for the teachers have been conducted on activity based learning and mathematics.

This project is implemented with active collaboration with the district and state governments of Chhattisgarh and supported by the Paul Hamlyn Foundation.

Support from Tharangambadi

Tharangambadi is an NGO from the 3 Suisses International Group which has visited TF for the last three years to create a better environment for the children through "Shramdaan". This year, 14 volunteers from 5 different countries went to Dantewada to renovate the girls' residential unit. In only one week, they helped



in plastering the courtyard, painted all the living halls, established a computer centre, arranged for pure drinking water and facilities for entertainment. Many activities were also organized like dancing, singing, making masks or playing volleyball with the trainees from the TF Shilpa Gram project.

Jyotishka

Jharkhand is one of the most affected states as far as seasonal migration is concerned. Every year thousands of poor labourers with their families migrate to work in the brick kilns of West Bengal, Odisha and Bihar. The children are a bonus to the contractors and brick kiln owners as: **a)** the children are engaged in work and not paid or partly paid and **b)** the children help their parents to meet the daily targets. They live only for five months in the year in their own villages.

The Right to Education Act (2009) makes education a fundamental right of every Indian child between the ages of 6 and 14. To implement this act is the states responsibility though very little has been done buy the Government of Jharkhand for the children of migrant labourers. In 2011, 3 seasonal hostels have been established by TF in the 3 most affected Panchayats of Jharkhand. These hostels currently house 198 children and provided basic stay facilities as well as remedial education, cultural activities and games. After 8 months spent in the seasonal hostels, the children return to their homes when their parents come back in May.

TF is the only organization which raised the issue of mainstreaming children affected by seasonal migration and created models which could be replicated. Due to this, TF has gained considerable recognition and has been encouraged to keep on working.

The Jyotiskha project is supported by Aid Foundation BHARATI (Netherlands) and implemented in collaboration with ASHA, Ranchi.

Development through Sports



This programme was started in February-2010, when some students of Sport Dans La Ville (SDLV) - a France based NGO came to TF to participate in a football exchange programme. As part of this intervention regular football classes were started in Kolkata, Dantewada and Bijapur. The programme uses sports as a means of teaching the importance of teamwork, leadership and social integration.

For the last 3 years, some students from SDLV come to India in February -March to participate in the exchange programme and to take part in cultural activities with the TF students.. Children from TF also go for a 15 day long summer camp organized in France. Last summer, 3 children from Dantewada and Bijapur, Komal, Kamla and Santosh visited France. They also participated in various cultural activities. This has been proved to be a great motivating factor for children from both the organizations and helped them to widen their views and boost their self-confidence.

In Kolkata most difficult children, who lack concentration in class rooms, were targeted first. The coordinator of the Mother Project, Arpan Bhattacharjee

trained the Kolkata boys every Saturday. In Dantewada all the girls and in Bijapur all the boys played football every day.

For the last 3 years, TF children have been participating in the Charity Cup, a football tournament organized by the French Embassy for the benefit of TF and Tara, a Delhi based NGO. This year, the TF girls' team lost in a hard fought final but the winning team gave the TF girls' team their trophy as reward for the teamwork, willingness and skills displayed on the ground!

Volunteer football coaches from France have provided the children the required training. TF recently bade farewell to Eric Carpentier founder of A Cup of the World (ACOW), a French organization to help underprivileged children with skills of football, who trained the Bijapur boys and the Dantewada girls for 6 months. He walked all over France with a football to raise funds for his trip to Bijapur and to help the children there with necessary equipments. TF is very grateful to Eric Carpentier and his association ACOW for his support and for the wonderful training he has given to the Uttaran-Bastar children...



Dishari

The Dishari project, was initiated in 2011 to improve the level of quality education and child protection in re-opened schools after extremist insurgency in the various centres of Dantewada and Sukma districts of Chhattisgarh.

In fact, due to internal conflicts schools inside the remote villages in Dantewada and Sukma were destroyed. As a remedial measure, large residential centres have become the most important institutions for enrolling out- of- school children who do not have lack of access to schools in their respective villages. To ensure age appropriate enrolments of the children, the Dishari project has adopted a multi-faceted approach.

After Dishari's intervention in these centres, positive changes have taken place. The Situation Analysis has helped the district to take necessary steps in improving the condition of the centres. The most important achievement of Dishari in the first year is the strong linkages it has established with the District Administration as well as the Education Department in Dantewada.

Sports and cultural programmes like theatre or football as well as training on Mathematics and Library Management have been organized by the Dishari team to develop the skills of the children and teachers.

The Dishari team has prepared a detailed manual, in Hindi, describing each chapter which the teachers have to deal with while teaching the students. The team has also developed a comprehensive tool to test achievement levels in language and mathematics and has conducted the test in all the targeted centres of Dantewada district.

The project has been implemented through close collaboration with the district administration and is supported by the state unit of UNICEF.

Shilpa Gram

Since April 1st, 2011 TF has started a skill development training and job placement project for the youth of South Bastar (Dantewada). The project is a residential one for illiterate and semi literate youth. The project focuses on 3 trades a) Electrician, b) Plumber, c) Welder.

During the 4 months training programme, the trainees were provided theory classes and practical classes. The trainees also did an internship in ongoing projects in different construction sites which helped them in the enhancement of their required skills.

Some of the trainees have been placed in jobs in different sectors. Many of them opted for self employment in their own village or wanted to continue their education.

The project has been supported by Zila Panchayat, South Bastar (Dantewada) under Integrated Development Action Plan for L. W. E. District.

Sponsorship Programme

TF supports children from deprived backgrounds throughout their educational career. The Sponsorship Programme has been implemented to ensure the economic, social, physical and educational needs of these children from deprived backgrounds through resource generation, resource utilization and continuous monitoring of their progress. The objective is to help them become responsible and self reliant adults. The sponsorship facilities extend from the pre-school level up to graduation. Students who are above 18 years can receive vocational training or go to university, depending on their ability.

In 2012-2013, 97 children were supported by the Sponsorship Programme.

Significant Accounting Policies and Notes on Accounts

(Followed in forming Financial Statements for the year ended March 31st, 2013)

1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a. BASIS OF ACCOUNTING :

i) These accounts have been prepared in accordance with historical cost convention, applicable accounting standards issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India and relevant provisions of the Society Act, 1961.

ii) A financial and administration. Manual, following standards to maintain transparency is prepared and ratified by the Governing Body of the organization. This manual is followed in carrying out accounting activities. This manual is available with all units as well as on the website of the organization.

b. REVENUES/ EXPENDITURE RECOGNITION :

i) All grants are recognized on cash basis except a few grants which have been accounted for on accrual basis on receipt of confirmation from the Govt. Agencies / Donor Agencies. Expenditure and liabilities are recognized on accrual basis. In the case of a program undertaken with the support of some government and other agencies, though the funds received are in the nature of program execution charges under contract, the same is reported as grant in view of the restriction on the expenditure and its nature as reimbursement of expenses.

ii) Interest income is recognized on a time proportion basis considering the amount invested and the prevailing rate of interest.

c. CLASSIFICATION OF EXPENSES :

Out of the various activities carried on by the society, expenses incurred directly in working with and rendering services to the poor is named as Project Expenses as per different activities.

d. FIXED ASSETS :

Fixed Assets are stated at cost less depreciation and impairment of losses if any. Cost comprises the purchase price and any attributable cost of bringing the assets to its working condition for its intended use.

e. DEPRECIATION/AMORTIZATION

Depreciation on assets is provided on Written down Value method at rates and in the manner as prescribed in the income Tax Act 1961.

f. VALUATION OF INVESTMENT :

The short term investment has been valued at cost. The long term investment has been valued at cost less permanent diminution of value.

g. Treatment of Restricted Funds Budget based expenditure accorded by Funding Agencies and Funds Directly Facilitated to the Beneficiary Groups:



- i. The expenditure on projects taken up with the support of donor agencies is, as far as possible, incurred according to the plans and budgets agreed upon. However, deviations sometimes occur at the time of project execution depending upon various circumstances, such as location, awareness among the beneficiaries, local customs, availability of inputs, legal restrictions, etc. such variations, monitored regularly, are generally intimated to the donor in advance.
 - ii. In respect of specific funded activities under the directions of donors are separately accounted for, and other general donations are taken as revenue of the society in the year of receipt.
- h. **EMPLOYEES BENEFITS:**
- i. Employees Provident Fund maintained with the Employees Provident Fund Commissioner under EPF & Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952.
 - ii. Employees Health Insurance is maintained with The Employees State Insurance Corporation under ESIC Act, 1948.

2. NOTES ON ACCOUNTS :

- a) **FIXED ASSETS : ₹ 6235820.94**
Depreciation on Fixed Assets has been charged during the year at the rate and in the manner specified in the income Tax Act 1961.
- b) **INVESTMENTS : ₹ 4072612.10**
All Term Deposits are lying with Banks and shown under the head "Investment". An investment of Rs.2000000 has made by Society further during the year under audit.
- c) **EXPENSES INCURRED ON GOVERNING BODY : ₹ 482000.00**
During the year, the society has incurred the above expenditure on Traveling and Conveyance & other reimbursements of expenses.
- d) **OTHERS : ₹ 13633.00**
Auditor's remuneration has provided in accounts of ₹ 13633.00 including service tax ₹ 1500.00 during the year under audit.
- e) **SALE OF LAND**
The Land of the society has sold for ₹ 3978051.00 as on 17/08/2012-and profit on sale of Land is ₹ 726592.00 Out of the sale proceed of the Land of ₹ 20,00,000.00 has invested on Fixed Deposit and balance amount has expended for general purpose during the under audit.



- f) **PRIOR PERIOD DEPRECIATION**
Capital Reserve of the society is created with the fund provided by donor for purchasing of fixed assets. The prior period depreciation has adjusted proportionately against Capital Reserve and General Reserve on the basis of the amount involve for purchasing of fixed assets from two reserves.
- g) **DISCONTINUATION OF CARD PROJECT**
Card project of the society is discontinued during the year under audit. Some Fixed Assets of the Card Project are transferred to Core Project of the society and balance assets are gifted to employees who were involve with this project.
- h) **RECEIVABLES**
Receivables for the financial year ended 31.03.2013 is ₹ 1180000/- from RGSM – Dantewada of which ₹ 1000000/- was receivable for the Project – Uttarban Bastar (C.G.), Karli Center which is subsequently received on 10/05/2013 and ₹ 180000/- was receivable for the project – Shilpagram which is subsequently received on 29/07/2013.
